Summary of the Work:

On a deserted mountain road in the Dominican Republic in 1960, three young sisters were assassinated after visiting their jailed husbands, suspected rebel leaders. The Mirabal sisters became martyrs and mythical figures in their country, where they are known as Las Mariposas (the butterflies). Three decades later, Julia Alvarez brings the Mirabal sisters back to life in this fictionalized account.

Rationale:

In the Time of the Butterflies is an excellent work that adds to the global perspective that World Literature tries to develop in the students. It is a novel by an acclaimed author and professor of writing at Middlebury College in Vermont. The voice is authentic as Julia Alvarez is from the Dominican Republic and she offers a native view of the history of oppression and revolution in the modern era. Additionally, this book represents a Latin American voice so prominent in our culture that we should represent in a World Literature class. Finally, the use of four narrators adds to the complexity of voice and point of view.
